## **About the Exhibition**

The exhibition is in honor of JDC-Eshel's Jubilee year. It presents a visual look at Israel's older adult population while acknowledging one of the prominent social changes we are experiencing – the rise in life expectancy. This change is accompanied by previously unknown personal, social, and national challenges.

The photographs presented are from the **Long Exposure** photography competition, which was held between February and March 2019 and focused on the growing life expectancy in Israel.

The competition was produced by **JDC-Eshel** in collaboration with **PHOTO IS:RAEL**. It is based on the understanding that photography is a medium that can reflect existing reality while raising aspects and issues that should be addressed by developing solutions for the needs of Israel's diverse older population.

572 photographers and photography enthusiasts, aged 16 - 90, took part in the competition and presented their view on a variety of topics: active aging, relationships, family, loneliness, happiness, despair, leisure activities, employment, poverty, hobbies, functional decline, birthday celebrations, multigenerationalism, multiculturalism, end-of-life and more.

Meirav Marodi


Both my sides:

I wanted to stimulate visibility of older femininity, the physical aspects that are not expressed in the media.





## Yafit Ploznik

My father. A charismatic person. For years he struggled with cancer. At age 85 he succumbed to the disease and gave up his work clothes. From an independent man of action he became a nursing patient. Documentary photography became a therapeutic tool for me, through which I learned to accept my father's and my own vulnerability and sensitivity.



## Yahav Gamliel

At the tempo of Flamenco. A backstage view of older Flamenco dancers, a moment before they go on stage.

Flamenco raises the heartbeat and the spirit of youth every time.

#### **Omer Messinger**

Long exposure is used to bring details out of the shadows and reveal them or, alternatively, to increase the sense of movement in the frame. In both cases information is enriched. This is equivalent to the mental process that asks us to let go of places that cannot be controlled, and first and foremost our surrender and acceptance of death.

The picture documents my grandmother. Death is present, balanced with the full life visible in every atom of her being. The freezing is as visible as the motion. Everything is rich, harmonious, and simultaneous.





#### Noga Or-Yam

Shared showers. The photograph documents my mother sitting on the floor of the bath. As a child on kibbutz she would take communal showers with the children in her age group. Now she lies alone among the bath tiles. I am before her, terrified at the thought that one day I will have to shower her myself.



## Shai Aloni

Foreign support. They arrived from different, distant countries. They have different religions and customs, and speak a multitude of languages. The search for employment and a promising future for their children has separated them from their families for years and brought them to our families. They bring patience, dedication, understanding, sensitivity, loyalty, and endless giving. Very quickly they become part of the family and the people closest to our loved ones for whom they care. On the surface it seems like an excellent arrangement. But what about the ones being cared for? Are they as happy as we are with this arrangement? And what does it say about us as a society? Kundan Parmar, 38 years old, born in India, worked in an optics factory. Came to Israel in 2011, left two children and a wife at home. Cares for 101-year-old Brigadier General Yitzhak Pundak. Kfar Yona 2013.



#### **Assaf Friedman**

Batya Kvasnikov, born in Moldova in 1924, immigrated to Israel in 1993. A Red Army veteran, she was conscripted at 17 and fought alongside the Allies in WWII in the support brigade, repairing clothes and shoes.

Batya passed away during the photography project.



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
